She works with victims of suspected physical/sexual abuse, neglect and sex trafficking at the Stephanie Blank Center for Safe and Healthy Children at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, where children receive forensic interviews regarding the suspected abuse, medical evaluations, mental health assessments and treatment. Jordan oversees child abuse prevention programs at the Center, conducts research on child sex trafficking and provides trainings on all aspects of child maltreatment for medical and nonmedical professionals working with children. She gives trainings locally, nationally and

internationally, working with child-serving professionals to prevent, identify and intervene in cases of suspected abuse and sex trafficking.

Dr. Greenbaum is a consultant for the International Centre for Missing and Exploited Children on their Global Health Initiative. She currently serves on the Executive Committee of the Ray Helfer Society, an international organization of child abuse physicians, and co-chairs the committee on Human Trafficking. She served on the board of the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children, and is a past-president. She co-chairs the Education/Training committee for HEAL Trafficking, an organization of medical professionals working on human trafficking issues. She is a member of the Georgia Children's Justice Coordinating Council Task Force on Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC). She chaired a workgroup that developed medical guidelines for evaluating victims of child sex trafficking for the American Society on the Abuse of Children and co-authored a clinical report on child commercial sexual exploitation for the American Academy of Pediatrics. Major professional interests include international education and training on child sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation, as well as child sexual abuse.

An MPH graduate from the Harvard School of Public Health, Dr. Macías-Konstantopoulos also completed a Global Health Fellowship at the MGH Center for Global Health, Dr. Macías-Konstantopoulos has a specific interest in public health and health policy development that address social determinants of health, particularly as they pertain to the health and well-being of vulnerable, disenfranchised patient populations.

Through her pioneering work on health and human trafficking, Dr. Macías-Konstantopoulos was instrumental in the development of anti-trafficking work as a core program of the MGH Emergency Department's Division of Global Health & Human Rights. She is the co-founding Director of the MGH Human Trafficking Initiative and Director of the MGH Freedom Clinic, an innovative primary and preventative health care clinic for human trafficking survivors that won the 2014 Partnership for Freedom national competition. Dr. Macías-Konstantopoulos has published and lectured widely on health and human trafficking. Having worked with the International Organization for Migration's Counter-Trafficking Unit in Indonesia and represented MGH at the 2008 UN Global Forum to Fight Human Trafficking in Vienna, she is considered an expert in the field. She is a member of the New Hampshire Attorney General's Commission to Combat Human Trafficking, the Education and Training Policy Implementation Committee of the Massachusetts Attorney General's Interagency Human Trafficking Task Force, the Leadership Advisory Board for a new federal Massachusetts State Child Welfare Trafficking Grant, and the SOAR National Technical Working Group for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. In addition, Dr. Macías-Konstantopoulos is Chair of the Massachusetts Medical Society Committee on Violence Intervention and Prevention, Director of the MGH Violence Intervention and Advocacy Program, and a member of the Physician's for Human Rights Asylum Network.
